Grade Separated U-Turn Program Overview




- The NJTA has initiated the Grade-Separated U-Turn Program to provide for safe travel movements for emergency response and maintenance personnel.
- The Program replaces 23 "cut-throughs" in the median barrier with 7 new U-Turns.
- Placement was optimized to meet NJTA maintenance and emergency response needs while also limiting right-of-way, utility, and environmental impacts.
- U-Turns exist north of Interchange 4 and are required by NJTA design standards.

Grade Separated U-Turn Program Overview



- The Program has coordinated extensively with emergency response personnel, including State Police, County OEM coordinators, first responders, and the DVRPC Transportation Group.
 - July 2022: NJ State Police
 - Nov 2022 Jan 2023: County Offices of Emergency Management
 - March 2023: DVRPC Transportation Group Leadership
 - Fall 2024: DVRPC Transportation Group Full Membership
 - November 21, 2024: Burlington County
 - December 6, 2024: Camden, Gloucester, Salem







Grade Separated U-Turn Program Overview




- Replace median cut-throughs (23) with grade-separated structures (7 new)
- Final Design began in March 2023, Construction at MP 29.1: 2025-2026
- Current Status: Phase C Design (90%)

Median cut-through closures will follow U-Turn completion





MP 29.1 U-Turn – Background




- Essex Road Overpass (I-295 Exit 31) built in 1982 to accommodate U-Turn Ramp underneath the structure – U-Turn not constructed at the time.
- NJTA advanced the U-Turn to 30% Final Design (Phase A) in 2018 under OPS No. T3664. Not advanced due to reprioritization of funding.
- Included in Current Grade-Separated U-Turn Program.
- 1-4 Capacity Enhancement Improvements allow for Improved U-Turn Design –
 i.e. vertical clearance, turning movements.



MP 29.1 U-Turn Plan – Retaining Wall



- A retaining wall will be constructed on the east (northbound) side of the Turnpike for the U-Turn ramp as it descends toward the underpass.
- Wall will not be visible from ground level.





Environmental Commitments and No Net Loss




- The MP 29.1 U-Turn is subject to the following environmental commitments:
 - NJDEP Land Use Freshwater Wetlands General Permit 10A
 - NJDEP Flood Hazard Area Individual Permit
 - Stormwater Management
 - Soil Erosion and Sediment Control
 - No Net Loss Reforestation Act Application Submitted on October 30, 2024
 - Amendment provided to NJFS on January 9, 2025
- State entities are required to abide by the No Net Loss Reforestation rules when trees are removed for projects under the following conditions:
 - One-half acre or more of forested land is affected, and
 - Land will be owned or maintained by a State entity
- A public forum is required when tree clearing is greater than 1 acre





Measuring Tree Impacts – "Qualified Forest"






- NJDEP has established a statewide GIS grid, which is used to identify "qualified forest."
- Qualified forest that is cleared must be addressed under No Net Loss.
- Within a given grid, an area is considered qualified established forest if it has:
 - 33% or more canopy cover, and
 - Trees predominantly 4" or greater in diameter.
- 1.1 acres will be impacted by the MP 29.1 U-Turn.

Tree Impact Mitigation



- Under No Net Loss, the following options exist for mitigation:
 - Planting on-site
 - Planting off-site on public land (State, County, or municipal)
 - Monetary compensation to the NJDEP State Forestry Fund, which provides grants to municipalities
- Planting on-site at MP 29.1 is infeasible due to site constraints and design requirements.
- The Program Team reviewed potential suitable public locations with the Borough for off-site planting.





Off-Site Mitigation Options


- A review of Lawnside Borough Open Space was conducted to determine if alternative-site locations were viable for reforestation under the NNL Rules.
- The following parks were determined ineligible as they all contained either:
 - Already forested areas (e.g. Cooper River Park & Block 802, Lot 44); or,
 - o Active recreational areas (e.g. Lawnside Community Center & Lawnside Recreation Complex).

Compensation to State Fund for Reforestation



- If re-planting within the municipality is not viable, impacts can be mitigated through a contribution to the New Jersey Forestry Service, which provides grants to municipal and county governments.
- Compensation is calculated as follows:
 - Reforestation Cost = Compensatory Reforestation Obligation (trees) x
 Per Tree Rate (\$300)
 - Monetary Compensation = Reforestation Cost + (10% Reforestation Area)
 - NJTA's anticipated contribution for MP 29.1 = \$74,250

Proposed Monetary Compensation	\$67,500

Total Monetary Contribution Calculation	\$6,750 (10% Reforestation Cost)
